



MOLLY COMBINES THERAPY AND PLAY WITH QUEST 88

Three year old Molly Grove from Worcestershire is a fantastic example of how people of all ages and levels of disability can truly benefit from cycling.

Molly was born with spastic diplegia cerebral palsy which gives her extreme stiffness and tightness in the back of her legs. Parents Rich and Becky were looking for ways to make her daily physio more fun orientated, prior to selective dorsal rhizotomy (SDR) surgery, and as part of her recovery.

As soon as they saw the Kitten they knew Molly would love it and, more

importantly, it would help her by ensuring she would have therapy and fun at the same time.

Becky explains: "Following several meetings and assessments, Molly received her sparkly pink Kitten and the effects have been tremendous because Molly now has therapy sessions without realising it. It has also greatly improved her confidence as she now joins in with her brothers and friends - and we can now take all the children on their bikes to the local park like any other family. The Kitten is the smallest of the Quest 88 tricycles and with a maximum weight limit of 25kg is ideal for children aged two to five years. The tricycle's fixed gear

means when the pedals rotate, the drive wheel rotates and vice versa, creating added momentum that assists with pedalling. This is beneficial to children with low muscle tone and strength. The Kitten can be fitted with a number of accessories including hip and thoracic supports, footplate and ankle foot orthoses.
